SATURDAY 4TH APRIL - ADULT'S CINEMA CLUB – 7.30pm

Set against the glamorous golden age of Formula 1 racing in the 1970s, this Ron Howard film is based on the true story of a great sporting rivalry between handsome English playboy James Hunt (portrayed by Chris Hemsworth), and his methodical, brilliant opponent, Austrian driver Niki Lauda (Daniel Bruhl). What's on in our group of Parishes during April?


Whether you are here or away on holiday I wish you a very happy Easter on behalf of our group of parishes.

This year we will be marking Holy Week with the following events, and to which you are invited to join with us as we celebrate our Lord's passion and resurrection. It is week full of drama as the story unfolds over eight days.

Tuesday 31st March

There is a special 'Chrism Mass' at Lincoln Cathedral where the holy oils, which we use at baptisms and for healing services, are blessed by the bishop. It is a wonderful service and you are most welcome to attend. It starts at 11am but if coming I suggest you get there by 10.30am.



Maundy Thursday 2nd April

On Maundy Thursday we remember Jesus celebrating the Last Supper with his disciples and washing their feet as an example of humble service. In the morning there is a service of Holy Communion at Heckington Methodist Chapel at 10am and in the evening at 7pm a service of foot washing and Holy Communion at Screddington church, followed by a prayer vigil of an hour.

Good Friday 3rd April

On Good Friday we meet at Great Hale church at 9.30am for 'Stations of the Cross'. It's a meditative service that follows the path of Jesus on his way to the cross. There are 14 pictures to help us as we think of that journey and pray for the world. At 10.30am we walk from Great Hale church up to Heckington village green carrying a large wooden cross, singing as we go. At 11am there is an open-air service at Heckington village green where the dramatized story of the crucifixion is read by people from the local churches. Afterwards Hot Cross buns are served in the Methodist chapel. In the evening at 7pm there will be a Good Friday Mass at St Andrew's Heckington during which our choirs will be singing some of the lovely music composed for such occasions.

Easter Sunday 5th April

There is a Dawn Eucharist at St Andrew's at 6am as we light our new paschal candle and carry it into a darkened church to celebrate our Lord's resurrection. For those who come it is followed by a cooked breakfast. All are welcome. There will also be services of Holy Communion at Swaton and Great Hale at 9.30am, and at Helpringham and Heckington at 11am. In the evening there will be a service of Holy Communion at Screddington.

Easter Monday 6th April

We have our usual Easter Monday 'Emmaus' walk at 2pm from St Oswald's Howell to St Andrew's at Asgarby. You can bring your dog and horse too if you like. We have an informal Easter service at 3pm at Asgarby, followed by tea in the church.

Lincolnshire Folk Evening at Helpringham Church

On **Saturday 11th April** we will be holding a special Lincolnshire evening at Helpringham church at 7pm. There will be several folk acts and a talk by local radio presenter Tom Lane. PARISH COUNCIL & LOCAL ISSUES

Everyone is encouraged to attend a Parish Council meeting to listen to local issues, raise their concerns or ask the Council questions. . . The first 15 minutes of every Parish Council meeting is open to the public to speak out and ask, after all the issues raised by the public the meeting is 'closed' and the official council meeting commences. This month only two issues were raised by the public. . .

PUBLIC SPEAKING:

West End: There was strong public concern about some repairs to the road and verges on West End. Members of the public said the work was totally inadequate and would be a quagmire of mud as soon as it rained. The Chairman said he would look at the area and contact the County Council.

House Numbering: There were concerns that many of the houses had names rather than numbers. Residents have been asked through the newsletter to display their house names prominently. Members of the public said that the lack of numbering may make it difficult for the post, deliveries and emergency services. The Chairman said he would see if he could find out who is responsible for house numbering and report back in a future meeting.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Vandalism etc. Some recent vandalism in Swaton has been reported to the police. An incident of suspected drug taking was also being investigated.

Lighting. No further lighting or changes were needed in Swaton - that was the view of the majority of residents who responded to a survey as were either satisfied with the lighting, or did not think more was needed. In view of this majority opinion, the Council proposed that no further action should be taken to investigate more lighting.

Flooding and Drainage: Some work may be done to alleviate flooding problems in Swaton. All of Swaton's councillors attended a Black Sluice event. The Chairman said that this was mainly about the Boston pumping station. However, Cllr Chris Richardson, the Council's flood liaison officer, has been in talks with the various agencies. He told the last meeting that work was in hand to look at flood relief along the river before it came into the village.

Much of the work will rely on grant funding, but if successful, it is hoped to start this in 2016/17

Quality Council. Swaton parish council has been accepted as a Foundation level council in the new Quality council scheme which starts this year. As an existing Quality Council, it has been granted Foundation status ahead of those councils who will have to qualify from scratch.

Speeding: The majority of vehicles during a recent speeding survey were travelling at over 35mph through Swaton. The PCSO who organised the survey will now organise a full speeding enforcement session, with offending drivers receiving tickets.

Grass cutting: Swaton parish council has an new grass cutting contractor. The last meeting appointed Continental Landscapes the contract for this year. Four quotes had been received and Continental was the preferred choice.

Litter Picking and footpath clearing: Swaton village is kept litter free by Mr Henk Buijs. He was thanked by the Parish council for his litter picking duties in Swaton, and his regular reports. Much of the litter is thrown from vehicles which travel through the village/ Henk and a team also spent some time clearing and widening a footpath through the village along the Main Street, The Chairman thanked those involved for this work.

Clerk's Qualification: Swaton's parish clerk has been accepted as a Fellow of the Institute of Local Council Managers. Mrs Shelagh McIntyre was congratulated by the Council. This is the highest level, and she is the only current Clerk in Lincolnshire to achieve this. The Institute was formed in order to encourage, support and reward Parish and Town Clerks who achieve this professional recognition.

Broadband: Swaton will have fibre optic broadband by July 1st. D/Cllr Mrs Kate Cook told the last council meeting that work was still on course for this target date.

Elections. Anyone wishing to be a Parish Councillor has to have their completed nomination forms returned to NKDC by 4pm on April 9th. Swaton councillors and members of the public received updates on the procedures from the Chairman and Clerk who had attended a briefing meeting at NKDC. Up to date details and notices are on the Notice board at the Hut

COOKERY CORNER

We have many great cooks and home bakers in our village, some of whom share their talent when running the Saturday morning café. A particular favourite of mine is Pat Kempster's Dorset Apple Cake – I convinced Pat to be our first feature baker and share this recipe with us all.

This recipe is great all year round and especially when locally grown apples are in season. It can be eaten hot as a pudding or cold as a cake. For an alternative you can also use blackcurrants instead of apples.

DORSET APPLE CAKE

This is a very old country recipe which was passed down to Pat by her Mother in Law. Pat said she will always be grateful to her as it is a real family favourite and hopes you'll enjoy it too.



Ingredients.

- * 12 ounces Self Raising Flour.
- * 6 ounces Sugar.
- * 12 ounces Chopped Apple. Either Cooker or Eater.
- * 6 ounces Margarine or Butter.
- * 4 ounces Currants
- * A little Milk and 1 Egg to mix.

Method.

1. Rub fat into flour until it resembles bread crumbs.
2. Add Sugar, Currants and Apple.
3. Mix all together with Egg and Milk to make stiffish dough.
4. Put into an 8 inch, greased, cake tin and spread mixture evenly.
5. Place into a pre heated oven 200 C or 400 F for 10 minutes.
6. Reduce heat to 150 C or 300F for 1 hour or until a skewer, inserted into centre of cake, comes out clean.
7. Turn out when cool enough to handle and sprinkle with sugar, white or brown.

SIMNEL CAKE

It is Easter and a seasonal feature for this time of year is the **Simnel Cake**. Simnel cake is a light fruit cake with two layers of almond paste or marzipan, one in the middle and one on top that is toasted, and eaten during the Easter period in the United Kingdom, Republic of Ireland and some other countries.

Simnel Cake was originally made for the middle Sunday of Lent, when the forty day fast would be relaxed Laetare Sunday, also known as Refreshment Sunday, Mothering Sunday, Sunday of the Five Loaves, and Simnel Sunday – after the cake.

Conventionally eleven, or occasionally twelve, marzipan balls are used to decorate the cake, with a story that the balls represent the twelve apostles, minus Judas or Jesus and the twelve apostles, minus Judas.¹ This tradition developed late in the Victorian era, altering the mid Victorian tradition of decorating the cakes with preserved fruits and flowers.



Simnel cakes have been known since at least medieval times. Recently, they became a Mothering Sunday tradition, when young girls in service would make one to be taken home to their mothers on their day off. The word *simnel* probably derived from the Latin word *simila*, meaning fine, wheaten flour.

A popular legend attributes the invention of the Simnel cake to Lambert Simnel; however, references to the cake were recorded some 200 years before his birth. Different towns had their own recipes and shapes of the Simnel cake. Bury, Devizes and Shrewsbury produced large numbers to their own recipes, but it is the Shrewsbury version that became most popular and well known.

Simnel cake is generally made from white flour, sugar, butter, eggs, fragrant spices, dried fruits, zest and candied peel.

Plant and Grow

You just about know when winter is over as the Aconites and Snow Drops push through the soil to perk up your garden with some much sought after colour. Once they have flowered you can break up large clumps and transplant in the 'green' around your garden for even more colour next year.

It's also the time to think about your garden for the up and coming season. For some budding gardeners they have already started putting in early seeds to get a head start and checking on those cuttings taken last year to make sure they have rooted well. Check any seed collected last year to make sure its in good condition and ready to sow when necessary.

Usually March – April (depending on outside temperature) mark the time when you need to sow seeds either indoors or outdoors. More about sowing seeds next time.

For now I'm busy mulching newly dug over soil and adding home made compost to make sure there is enough nutrient to feed any new or existing plants this year. If you don't have any home made compost I find using a grow bag or two does the job just as well. This is quite inexpensive (about £1.29 a bag) if you use grow bags from B&M, Lidl or Aldi for example.

VANDELISM & LITTER

Litter and dog poo were highlighted as issues in last month's newsletter but both continue to blight our village in certain areas (I've even heard of an area in our village being nicknamed Poo Corner !) – those who can't be bothered to take their litter home or throw it away in the appropriate place (public bins) or are selfishly too lazy to clear up their dog's poo simply spoil it for others – please consider your neighbours as well as outside visitors to Swaton not to mention the 'Law' and clear up after yourself and your pets.

Its great that Swaton has a dedicated area for kids to play in (which is in the process of becoming a proper park) but there have been reports received of littering, vandalism and bad language in and around the Play Area.

A litter pick has taken place and the Police have been informed in regards to items found and a further watch will be kept. **PLEASE DO NOT THROW LITTER** over the fence or leave in the field – USE the litter bin provided.

Please do not allow a small number of users to spoil it for the rest !



IT'S THE EASTER HOLIDAYS

There have been break-ins & burglaries in the local and wider area as well as thefts from cars. Garages and out buildings continue to be targeted as well as gardens so do ensure any access to your gardens and outbuildings are secure.

Over the past year, Swaton itself has been subject to a few thefts - mainly from outbuildings and gardens. These toe rags go from village to village looking for an opportunity to nick anything not screwed down so lock away garden tools etc . Let's not make it easy for them.

If you are going away for Easter ensure your house is locked, use lights on a timer and ensure someone you trust is aware your house is empty and can keep an eye on it for you.

If you're at home in the day remove your dustbin from the roadside after they've been emptied by the bin men – leaving the bin on the grass verge or pavement is a good sign that you're out – if you're out ask a neighbour to pull the bin out of sight for you.

There have been a few instances of hare coursing around the village. We have passed on info to the police which is helping them identify these undesirables!!

I am convinced that the door stickers which are now displayed by most Swaton residents are a good deterrent and do work so if you require some 'cold caller' warning stickers or a property marking kit call your NHW coordinators.

Oil Thefts: Unfortunately there has been another Oil theft in Swaton – this time it was from a house in Parsons Drove and in excess of 500 litres were taken. Please do ensure your Oil Tank is secured with good locks although these thieves appear to getting through locks so if you can obscure your tank from being easily seen that would help

REMEMBER - If we see anything suspicious then call the POLICE. In an emergency call 999 otherwise pass the information via the 101 system. Alternatively you can call a NHW coordinators who will happily pass the information for you. Typical info needed includes registration number of vehicle, make and model of vehicle if possible and a description of occupants . . . BUT BE SAFE - no heroics.
